

Reading: Isaiah 58:1-12

- L ¹Shout out; do not hold back!
 Lift up your voice like a trumpet!
 - Announce to my people their rebellion,
 - to the house of Jacob their sins.
 - ² Yet day after day they seek me
 - and delight to know my ways,
 - as if they were a nation that practiced righteousness
 - and did not forsake the ordinance of their God;
 - they ask of me righteous judgments;
 - they want God on their side.
 - ³ "Why do we fast, but you do not see?
 - Why humble ourselves, but you do not notice?"
 - Look, you serve your own interest on your fast day and oppress all your workers.

- ⁴You fast only to quarrel and to fight and to strike with a wicked fist. Such fasting as you do today will not make your voice heard on high.
- 5 Is such the fast that I choose, a day to humble oneself? Is it to bow down the head like a bulrush and to lie in sackcloth and ashes? Will you call this a fast, a day acceptable to the Lord?
- ⁶ Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the straps of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke?
- ⁷ Is it not to share your bread with the hungry and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them and not to hide yourself from your own kin?
- 8 Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you; the glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard.
- ⁹ Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, "Here I am." If you remove the yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil,
- ¹⁰ if you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday.
- 11 The Lord will guide you continually and satisfy your needs in parched places and make your bones strong, and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water whose waters never fail.

- ¹² Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in.

*Gospel: Luke 9:51-62

P 51 When the days drew near for him to be taken up, he set his face to go to Jerusalem. 52 And he sent messengers ahead of him. On their way they entered a village of the Samaritans to prepare for his arrival, 53 but they did not receive him because his face was set toward Jerusalem. 54 When his disciples James and John saw this, they said, "Lord, do you want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?" 55 But he turned and rebuked them. 56 Then they went on to another village. 57 As they were going along the road, someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." 58 And Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." 59 To another he said, "Follow me." But he said, "Lord, first let me go and bury my father." 60 And Jesus said to him, "Let the dead bury their own dead, but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God." 61 Another said, "I will follow you, Lord, but let me first say farewell to those at

my home." ⁶² And Jesus said to him, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God."

Invitation to Lent

P Friends in Christ, today with the whole church we enter the season of Lent - a time of focus and rekindling – a time when we remember Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection and how, in Christ, our lives our renewed.

Lent is a call to step forward, even when we're not fully ready. Are you ready to move toward transformation? Are you ready to listen for good news amid the noise and division around our world? Are you ready to set Lent intentions, even with this year's challenges? Are you ready to begin again?

Here at Trinity, we are inviting you to experience the fullness of Lent through a daily devotional based on the Gospel of Luke (more about that in a bit). We invite you to worship each Wednesday and each weekend. We invite you to prayer and sacrificial giving and acts of love like the Easter food box project – knowing that all these acts are strengthened by God's love given through the Word and the Sacraments. We want to walk this journey with all of you – through Holy Week and Easter.

Lent is here. So let us begin by acknowledging our need for repentance and God's mercy. Let us admit that we are not ready to follow, but that God, through sheer grace and forgiveness, sets us free to start walking. Freed by Christ from sin and all that draws us away from loving God and others, let us now confess our brokenness. Let us take this first step together.

*Confession and Forgiveness

- P Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another.
- C Most holy and merciful Father:
- P We confess to you and to one another, and before the whole communion of heaven, that we have sinned by our own fault, in thought, word, and deed; by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.

- C We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others, as we have been forgiven.
- P Have mercy on us, O God.
- C We have shut our ears to your call to serve as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit.
- P Have mercy on us, O God.
- C Our past unfaithfulness, the pride, hypocrisy, and the apathy that have infected our lives, we confess to you.
- P Have mercy on us, O God.
- C Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people, we confess to you.
- P Have mercy on us, O God.
- C Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to share the faith that is in us, we confess to you.
- P Have mercy on us, O God.
- C Our neglect of human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty, we confess to you.
- P Have mercy on us, O God.
- C Our false judgments, our uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us, we confess to you.
- P Have mercy on us, O God.
- C Our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us, we confess to you.
- P Have mercy on us, O God.
- C Restore us, O God, and let your anger depart from us. Hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.
- P Hear the good news:

God so loved the world that God gave the only Son, so that all may receive life.

This promise is for you!

God embraces you with divine mercy, and

+ forgives you in Christ's name. Amen.

C Christ has died.


Christ is risen.

The Imposition of Ashes and Communion

Lent is a time for us to return to our Creator who formed us from the dust of the earth. Our lives are finite, so we want to spend every precious moment in tune with God, living whole, abundant lives—the kind of lives we were created to lead. And so in recognition of our origins in the earth, in acknowledgment of our finite days, we come to receive ashes and remember: dust we are, and to dust we shall return.

The imposition of ashes and distribution of Communion will take place together.

The ministers apply ashes to the forehead of each person at the first station with the words:


"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

If you do not desire ashes you may move directly to the communion station.

Communion will be served by intinction today. Receive the wafer from the server and then dip it into the wine or the grape juice before eating it. Gluten free wafers are available. Check with your server.

If for any reason you are not comfortable participating in communion today, we invite you to come forward with your arms crossed over your chest to receive a blessing.

LENT 2025

This year, we're letting the Gospel of Luke guide us through Lent. Beginning with Jesus setting his face toward Jerusalem (Luke 9:51), this series flows through several familiar stories—the Good Samaritan, Mary and Martha, the fruitless fig tree, the Lost Sheep, Zacchaeus, and more. In each narrative, Jesus intentionally highlights the cultural and political polarities of his time to emphasize the radical and inclusive love of God. Many of these stories mirror the divides we see in our families, churches and communities today. This series is an invitation to approach these polarities with more faith, intention, and openness to others. Each weekly theme will explore two supposed binaries, like "rest & growth" or "grief & hope." But life is often more nuanced and complex. God is present [in] between.



Journey with Jesus: Reading Luke through Lent

"Your word is a lamp to my feet and light to my path." Psalm 119:105

The season of Lent is a great time to commit to spending time with God and tending our spiritual life. This Lenten season we are inviting everyone at Trinity to read Scripture together as a spiritual discipline.

Using the devotional, Journey with Jesus, we will together read the Gospel of Luke, a chapter a day, along with other readings from the Bible that connect to Luke. Journal questions are provided to dig deeper and to reflect on the daily readings.

For those interested, there will be a *gathering at noon on Mondays during Lent in the Fellowship Hall, to discuss and process the Scripture for the past week in community.* People are encouraged to bring a lunch and to stay for whatever time their schedule affords. In journeying with Jesus' sacred story, may we be fed and grounded in God's word. <u>Copies are</u> available by the church offices and the Welcome Center.
