Campfire Kids Fun

S'mores and Bugs at Campfire Kids

Nate Ruge and Dani Vogel are leaders extraordinaire of Campfire Kids at Trinity...and they're also big kids at heart who shine in the presence of youth. Their combined background working with young people is pretty impressive. Ruge worked with youth and family in Christian Ed. Ministry at a local church for 14 years while Vogel has almost 18 years of experience. Put the two together in a room with kids and the energy is palpable.

Ruge and Vogel explained the origin of Campfire Kids. "It was invented the second week of August when we were meeting with 'the Dans' [also known as both Pastor Dan and Pastor Daniel]," Ruge said. Vogel added, "We always wanted to have a theme, Bible stories, no screens, and something that was interactive. The focus was to play with the Bible stories." Ruge said that a campfire is an informal place where we gather, and with Jesus being 'The Light,' the name "Campfire Kids" was a great fit. "We get to go to one [campfire]...and then another..." Ruge said. "It's not just

them sitting and listening to a Bible story." Vogel agreed, "It's interactive activity play-based interaction!" Ruge added, "We find new and unique ways to explore Bible stories."

That's exactly what was on the agenda on this particular Wednesday evening. A box full of small pieces of wood was awaiting the group, and Vogel pointed them out. "We're making table decorations tonight," she said, "and we're using leftover wood from Nate's house." Ruge grinned and said, "Sometimes you just gotta use the stuff that's around you! Be creative!" Both leaders stressed that they want to provide opportunities for the kids who come to Campfire Kids. "We want them to feel free to make a little mess and a little noise," Ruge said. "The more we play together, the more we see that relationships matter. It's always fun to play and learn." He stressed the benefits of spending time together and just hanging out with kids. "It infuses energy!" he laughed. Vogel agreed. She said, "We want kids who are excited to be here Sundays and Wednesdays...and be authentically who they are! We like the kids we have to peel out at the end of the night. We want to become the place people WANT to be!"

And why wouldn't they want to be at Campfire Kids? They learned about Jonah by doing a photo tableau; they did a science experiment that Moses and the Israelites followed in the desert, and once a month, they partner with Healthy Harvest and do a food project such as making fry bread and pickles.

Next month, they'll learn about Santa Lucia and who she was, playing with the church's Nordic heritage as well as talking about their own traditions. Learning and valuing traditions in their own family is huge. It's also important to know the traditions in their Trinity family. Ruge said the kids will be able to say, "I know what that is" as the Santa Lucia girls walk down the aisle at Christmas time. Not only will they know this tradition, but they'll also be able to make Santa Lucia Buns or

Lusserkat. Integrating faith with real life and finding connection points for kids is what this group is all about. So just as a campfire might often have s'mores and bugs, Ruge said Campfire Kids does as well. Instead of asking about the highs and lows of the week, he asks about the "s'mores" (as in 'What was so good this week that you'd like some more?') and the "bugs" (as in 'What bugged you?'). For a group of elementary schoolaged kids with several high schoolers who serve as mentors (along with Ruge and Vogel), the amount of sharing and camaraderie is amazing. "We've had a really active group," said Ruge. "Kids are coming with their friends. Some are 'Trinity-adjacent' or 'church explorers.'" Vogel said, "These are kids we see often. They say, 'Your church is fun!' They make a memory and find a tribe!" Ruge agreed, "Kids want to feel valued and want to belong."

From the "s'mores and bugs" to the birthday cake packages made for middle school families in need to the "thankful table decorations," the Campfire Kids made use of every moment one recent Wednesday night. At the same time, every moment was relaxed and filled with smiles and laughter and joking around. Young kids looked up to the high schoolers for guidance as they worked on a project or a craft or simply asked each other about how their day was going. At the end of the evening, Ruge asked if anyone would volunteer to say a prayer to end the night, and a boy raised his hand. It was the same boy who had asked me to take his picture with one of the high school mentors earlier in the evening. He thanked God for Campfire Kids, for Trinity's pastors, and for the great job the Campfire teachers were doing every week. It was so heartfelt and pure that I still cry thinking about it.

It's true. Being with kids will change your life. Ruge and Vogel know that, and they show up for them week after week. That's a definite "s'more." † (Photos lower left-opposite page)

Swedish Creativity at the Bazaar

DALA HORSE

The Scandinavian Bazaar always has gifts galore for everyone, and this year was no exception. A darling red Swedish Dala Horse was one of the finds this year and was created by the very creative husband/wife team of Jim and Cynthia Zach. What is a Dala Horse? It is a "symbol of strength, faithfulness, wisdom, and dignity,

and is a national emblem of Sweden. It also represents good luck, happiness, and prosperity."

How did this gorgeous piece in Trinity's Scandinavian Boutique come into existence? Cynthia explained:

"About 10 years ago, Jim and I were on vacation in Door County, WI, when I found a unique metal Dala Horse candle holder in a Scandinavian shop. I have a collection of the authentic Dala Horse, but thought that one was special. Over the years, we talked about putting our own version together and finally about 4 years ago, we decided to do it.

After working at NIACC for years, Jim knew that they had recently acquired a water jet cutter that would work for our project. He created a design based on the many patterns for the horse image.

Then we went to a local metal and welding shop to determine the best gauge of metal to use.

Once that was established, he took the one big sheet of metal out to NIACC to try out the water jet cutter. It worked perfectly!

The design included the Dala horse and a circle to attach to a thinly sawn birch log. We had approximately 35 perfectly cut horses that we took back to the metal and welding shop to bend the circle section at the base of the horse's legs and cut a hole on the base the size of a votive candle. The next step was to find a local business that could paint the horse stand. Fortunately, we found a powder coating business in Clear Lake that was willing to do this for a reasonable price and short amount of time! I took one of my Dala horses along to find a color match and was thrilled to find the best match!

Once the painting process was done, Jim carefully drilled a hole in the birch slices to match the hole in the metal stand. The birch slices were ordered through a bridal decoration store. The last step was to apply adhesive to the metal stand to attach to the birch slices. With the addition of the small votive candle, it was finished! We decided to donate them to the Scandinavian Boutique at Trinity's Bazaar!"

What will this creative duo come up with next year? A Santa? A Dala Horse? A stained glass window from Trinity? Their ideas all live in my household...and maybe yours as well. †

t was a midweek reprieve when 11 pilgrims of faith left the known security of home and family to listen to the Spirit of God at New Melleray Abbey near Peosta, IA. Step A Way is an initiative of Father Stephen Benitz, Northwest Regional Missioner for the Episcopal Diocese of Iowa, and Becky Elsbernd, parish nurse at Trinity Lutheran Church in Mason City. The two spiritual leaders have offered four walking pilgrimages – appropriately named Walk A Way – since 2023. This was the first entirely spiritual retreat offered Nov. 11-13.

The Abbey is home to about a dozen Trappist monks who live by the Rule of Saint Benedict. Their mission is to live in harmony with God, their brothers, and the natural world as they pray, eat, and work together. The visiting pilgrims attended several daily prayer times, among them 4:30 a.m. Vigils, 7:30 a.m. Lauds, 11:45 a.m. Sext, 1:45 p.m. None, 5:30 p.m. Vespers, and 7:30 p.m. Compline. They followed along and participated as the monks chanted and recited Psalms at each of the services along with prayer, Scripture, and other sacred readings. As the bells tolled before each service, the mindfulness of contemplation set it, sometimes in darkness, sometimes in light.

Our leaders directed us in the use of spiritual practices in group gatherings. Of the 11, a few were friends, a few acquaintances, a few strangers. We each shared a word we hoped to find in this time together, be it peace, love, safety, or discernment. Personal time to read, walk, and rest was purposely structured. Meals, for the most part, were eaten in silence or soft tones. A night walk to view the Northern Lights showed us we can follow each other only by the sounds of whispered voices — a reminder that the Spirit is ever present in humanity's darkness.

The Scripture for the pilgrimage was Mark's account of the Feeding of the 5,000. A new spiritual practice for some was to listen to the text and then visualize ourselves in the Gospel scene. Some would be among the tired and hungry disciples who were irritated with Jesus. How could they feed so many people with five loaves and two fish? Another was the servant gatherer of the baskets of leftovers, offering to share with more followers of The Way. And one sitting on the grass with the throng listened to Jesus and in His eyes saw love, compassion, and forgiveness.

The drive home was filled with welcome talk for some and continued quiet for others. The charge to continue what we learned and experienced at Step A Way was present as we returned to the sometimes-chaotic life and world. The lessons of this spiritual respite will live on when we intentionally make time to step away to listen to God the Holy Spirit each new day we are granted by His grace.
